Woodturning and "shop" is dying out in schools, and a large number of people have not encountered wood turning on a lathe. Tips and Tricks:



Dave Hunter showed a small bearing chuck used for supporting delicate work.

A small bearing is pressed into a block of nylon. The tail stock chuck is then screwed into the nylon. Small finials and other fragile work can be supported at both ends without marring.



August Demo

Phil's Phabulous Phinials "turned" out to be Don's Delightful Demonstration (Great alliteration, Carol!)

Don demonstrated turning the two possible versions of a spiral finial. Both are started with a rounded blank and should have a graceful curve from bulbous bottom to the tip.



Both are laid out the same way, by roughing it out, then indexing the form with a carpenter's flat pencil.

Don has a 12 position indexing head and showed how he holds the pencil steady in the same position while hand turning the piece to create the index line running from bottom to tip. Again using the pencil, he draws equal horizontal lines to create a graph of squares. He then connects the intersections of the grid to create a spiral line. It's also possible to use tape as a guide for the last step.

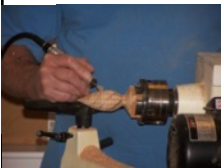


At this point, you can use a back saw to make the initial cuts. Amazingly, the cut is a straight cut, yet appears to swirl. Next, you have the option to use a set of Rifler files or rotary carving system with a flexible shaft.



There was discussion about the rotary carving. Don prefers a free-hanging, flexible shaft such as Foredom over a hand-held motor grinder combo such as Dremel. He always hangs the motor *above* the lathe so that the flexible shaft doesn't kink and allows more movement in carving. (Foredom parts are interchangeable with Weeher parts.)

He uses a wide rest, creating a tripod effect with lathe, arm and tool. He suggests using about 1/4 or 1/3 speed because a carbide burr at a high speed gets filled with dust and burns.



To finish, he showed spring-loaded sanding sticks, 80 and 120 grit, which enable getting down into the grooves for a nice finish.



Version 1 demonstrated a Spiral Finial. The main design element is the raised spirals around a solid interior.

Version 2 demonstrated a Flame. The technique is the same, but the wider grooves are the main design element of the finished product. This shape produces a "flame" appearance.



For the open spiral variety, Don hollows the wood blank on the lathe first. Then he lays out the grid and files through the wood to leave only the round spirals. Finishing is done with a strip of 120 or 220 to smooth the inside and a buffing wheel to smooth the outside. This takes much patience and perseverance.

As usual, Don held everyone's attention captive with an instructive demonstration.

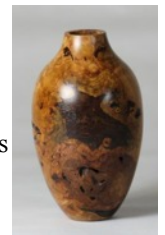

Black and white ebony pencil, using a Pentel pencil mechanism minus the plastic with 5 coats of new medium CA glue, wet sanding, and blue rouge buffing.
